BOLD WOMEN'S DAY—observed annually on the fourth Sunday of February—celebrates all Lutheran women who have acted or are acting boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ. In 2018, the day set aside to observe Bold Women's Day is Sunday, Feb. 25, but you can plan it on any day that works best for you and your congregation.

How are you celebrating Bold Women's Day? You can start by visiting welca.org/bwd and downloading our updated resources. The "Celebrate Bold Women's Day" resource, available in English and Spanish, offers a starting point for planning your special day.

It is important to realize that women are bold in different ways. Some women are bold in their unceasing prayers. Other women are bold in their service to those in need. Still other women are bold in their advocacy or through their hospitality.

Upstate New York SWO triples goal of 500 blankets, honors Katie Luther

THE UPSTATE NEW YORK synodical women's organization tripled its goal to sew or tie 500 blankets and quilts to honor the 500th anniversary of the reformation and Katharina von Bora Luther.

At their synodical women's convention this past September, they celebrated the completion of their 500 Quilt Challenge for the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation with 1,538 blankets and quilts.

Synodical president Susan Fox, Grace Lutheran Church, Oswego, N.Y., said that women from more than 30 congregations participated in the challenge.

"We had at least seven churches participate that do not have a Women of the ELCA group," Fox said. "We felt this was a great way to reach out and show our church where women are doing wonderful work."

The challenge honored the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in October 2017.

The women in Upstate New York look to Katie as a role model, especially for the care she took of the family home and business when her husband, Martin, was teaching and preaching, she said.

The SWO honored Katie through the quilt challenge because of her contributions to the Reformation movement, Fox said. After the quilts were counted and blessed, the SWO donated many of them to Lutheran World Relief.

Quilting brings women together, said Judy Holmes of Atonement Lutheran Church, Syracuse, N.Y., one of the churches that participated in the challenge. Many hands were needed to reach the goal. Even if they couldn't sew, they were welcomed, she said.

"What a fun challenge for our quilting groups," Holmes said. "It's also an opportunity to help women, children and families receive a warm quilt for a cold evening."

No community safe from human trafficking, activist says

WAYNETTE BRIDWELL LOVES HER FOUR GRANDCHILDREN and the “ton” of nieces and nephews in her family.

And she feels it’s her responsibility as a former nurse to alert them to the perils of human trafficking—and not only the young people of her family, but everyone who lives near her “backwoods” area of Zanesville, Ohio.

As one of six members of the Southern Ohio Synodical Women’s Organization anti-sex trafficking committee, she speaks in classrooms, seminars and churches about human trafficking.

“I want people to be aware of the issue,” Bridwell said. “People need to start to know what the signs and symptoms are. And then they need to call the anti-trafficking hotline number if they see something. You don’t have to be right—just suspicious.”

Human trafficking a priority

At its 2014 and 2017 triennial conventions, Women of the ELCA voting members vowed to make fighting human trafficking a priority. In 2014, a memorial requested that each synodical women’s organization assemble a task force to address human sex trafficking, an issue that has been a focus at every Women of the ELCA triennial convention since 2002. A resolution adopted at the 2017 convention established Jan. 11–Feb. 4, 2018, as a time of prayer to end human trafficking because it is believed trafficking increases in the region where the Super Bowl takes place.

In the rural area of Ohio where she lives, Bridwell said, many people have never heard of sex trafficking.

“But I tell people, ‘It happens here. Even in rural areas.’”

Human trafficking happens here too

“Human Trafficking Happens Here Too” is the message of three billboards the task force erected in rural Ohio: one each in Guernsey and Belmont counties, and one on the boundary between Monroe and Noble counties.

The money for the billboards came from a grant from the Deaconess Community, thanks to Sr. Sally Burk, who chairs the Southern Ohio SWO’s anti-trafficking committee, said Bridwell, a member of St. John’s Lutheran Church, Zanesville.

The grant from the Deaconesses paid for one month of advertising, she said. But after seeing the billboards, people came forward with gifts to keep them up longer.

“Right now, for us, it’s all about awareness,” Bridwell said. “Some people I talk to don’t think it exists here. But it happens everywhere.”

Board cuts budget, extends executive director term

THE 2017–2020 WOMEN OF THE ELCA executive board adopted a revised 2018 budget that increased funds for programming and eliminated two staff positions. The board also offered Linda Post Bushkofsky her fifth four-year term as executive director.

In an October 19–21, 2017, meeting in Chicago, the board, in executive session, adopted a revised budget of \$3,120,231.

The 2018 budget allows for a full-time staff of 11, a reduction of two; sets aside adequate funds for the 2020 triennial convention (one-third of the total cost); adds \$35,705 to the program budget, making it \$67,705; and allows for staff salary adjustments and raises, which had been deferred. The new annual budget also funds a staff position for director for justice, which has been vacant since May.

Program areas of the churchwide organization include discipleship, stewardship, intergenerational, justice and accompanying resources.

In her report to the executive board, Bushkofsky said, “It’s an exciting, heady time to be Women of the ELCA. We’re coming off a very successful triennial convention and gathering.”

She said the triennial gathering had higher than expected registration numbers (about 3,300), with more than 500 already signed up to attend the Eleventh Triennial Gathering 2020 in Phoenix, Ariz. The result of better-than-expected registration numbers at the gathering, Bushkofsky said, resulted in “the first time in a long time that income has exceeded our expenses.”

However, she said, the final budget numbers from the triennial gathering have not yet been tallied.

“There is much to celebrate, but we have the capacity to do so much more,” she said. “As we move into year 31, we can sit back and congratulate ourselves for what has been. Or we can challenge ourselves to live into the fullness of our foremothers’ visions of this organization as a radical change agent in the church.”

Revenues and expenses

With Thankofferings and regular offerings down, Bushkofsky said the organization must look at additional ways to raise money.

“I think the time has come that we have to be more strategic and intentional about how to grow,” she said.

Regular offerings are those collected in congregational units that benefit the unit, the synodical organization and the churchwide organization. Thankofferings are gifts forwarded to the churchwide organization in gratitude for all that God has done.

At the end of September, with the new budget year beginning February 1, 2018, revenue is at \$1,275,085 (\$1,222,014 below fiscal year projections), according to Executive Board Treasurer Anna Sarver. Expenses at \$1,778,374 were at 57 percent of the budget (\$3,093,318) with four months left in the fiscal year.

Other board actions

The board elected three members to serve on the executive committee. They are Elizabeth (Liz) Burgess of Augusta, Maine; Joy Michalick of Duluth, Minn.; and Karen Voris of Anchorage, Alaska. They join the four officers to make

up the executive committee. The officers are Lisa Plorin, president, Upham, N.D.; Becky Shurson, vice president, Eugene, Ore.; Freddie Jordan, secretary, Columbus, Ohio; and Anna Sarver, treasurer, Greensburg, Penn.

The board also

- voted to extend the executive committee term from one year to three, allowing the at-large members to serve the entire triennium.
- voted to remain committed to anti-racism training, allowing for no fewer than two hours training in its April 2018 meeting with additional reading and study beforehand.
- approved a request from the Virginia Synodical Women's (SWO) organization to reduce the size of its board from eight members to six.
- approved requests from the Southwestern Pennsylvania SWO to reduce the size of its board from nine to seven, and the Florida-Bahamas SWO to reduce the size of its board from eight to six provided they make consistent the language in their constitutions and advise the board of those revisions.
- denied a resolution forwarded from the Tenth Triennial Convention (2017) that would allow two

members of one congregational unit to serve on a synodical women's board.

- heard a report about a proposed partnership with Equal Exchange, a fair-trade non-profit organization, that could include workshops, training and trips.
- heard reports from the president, treasurer, executive director, staff and advisors.

The next board meeting is April 20–21, 2018.

Two staff positions ended October 30

AN EXECUTIVE BOARD DECISION to revise the 2018 Women of the ELCA fiscal year budget resulted in the elimination of two staff positions on Oct. 30.

The staff positions eliminated were those of associate executive director, held by Deborah Calvert, and administrative assistant, held by Vanessa Davis-Bragg, reported Executive Director Linda Post Bushkofsky.

“These are budget-driven decisions and do not reflect on performance,” Bushkofsky said. “We thank Deborah and Vanessa for their many years of service to this organization.”

Bushkofsky said with the remaining 11 positions, including hers as executive director, “staff will be able to adequately support women across the church as they live out the mission and purpose of Women of the ELCA.”

A search is beginning for candidates to fill the position of director for justice.

Conference of Presidents is February 23–25 in Chicago

EVERY YEAR ON THE THIRD WEEKEND IN FEBRUARY, Women of the ELCA invites the 64 synodical presidents to participate in the Conference of Presidents. The date for the 2018 event is February 23–25.

The theme of the conference, which will be held in Chicago at the Lutheran Center, is “Here I Am Lord” (Isaiah 6:8).

The Churchwide Constitution of Women of the ELCA, in Article XV, Section 2, Items 1–4, sets out the goals of the annual Conference of Synodical Presidents:

1. To provide and receive information related to emphases, priorities and projected programs of Women of the ELCA.
2. To make recommendations to the executive board.
3. To develop leadership skills.
4. To foster community and renewal.

Two ELCA staff members will be present: the Rev. Wyvetta Bullock, assistant to the presiding bishop, and Sr. Noreen Stevens of the Deaconess Community.
